### **Historical Note:**

During the early 20th century, "opera house" was generally used instead of theater. These entertainment venues were often located on the upper floor of buildings. Within its walls, one could enjoy a variety of acts, including plays, musicals, lectures, comedians, acrobats, animal acts, and magicians. The Walker Opera House was unique in that it was the first free-standing opera house in Champaign or Urbana. Originally known as the Armory, it was a large brick building located on the corner of Neil and Park streets in downtown Champaign and could seat over 1,500. The venue hosted its first performance on May 18, 1885. Celebrities that appeared at the Walker Opera House over the years include the Marx Brother, Sara Bernhardt, Enrico Carouso, Eddie Foy, Will Rogers, and boxing champ John L. Sullivan. The Walker Opera House hosted its last performance on April 25, 1914. The original building was demolished.

#### Scope and Content Note:

This collection consists of one scrapbook. The scrapbook contains playbills pasted onto the scrapbook pages. The playbills are 14" L x 5" W broadsides, and multiple are attached to a single page. The loose materials within the scrapbook have been removed, placed into folders, and divided into the series outlined in the arrangement section. An index of the play's titles and dates has been included at the end of this finding to reduce the scrapbook's handling. **Due to the scrapbook's fragile, nature it may not be photocopied or scanned. However, pictures may be taken with a camera.**
