Access:

The records are accessible to the public within applicable copyright restrictions and limited to use at the Champaign County Historical Archives of The Urbana Free Library. In accordance with HIPAA regulations, access to some medical records is restricted. Medical records over 100 years old are accessible to the public. Individuals have access to their own health information, and records will be made available to researchers with written authorization for access from the individual of interest. In all other circumstances, copies of medical records are available with all personal identifiers masked.

Biographical/Historical Note:

Dr. Ellen Miner practiced gynecology and obstetrics in Champaign, Illinois from 1896 until her retirement in the 1920s. She was born in 1854 to Charles and Eunice Miner and raised in Hensley, Champaign County, Illinois. Dr. Miner graduated from the Woman's Medical College of Chicago—known as the Medical Department for Women at Northwestern University after 1891—in 1893 and received her license to practice medicine in the state of Illinois the same year. In 1896, she returned to Champaign, Illinois and established a gynecology and obstetrics practice operating out of her home at 209 West Eureka Street. Dr. Miner was involved in the Champaign chapter of the Illinois State Medical Society and served as the secretary-treasurer in 1897 and the vice-president in 1910.

Dr. Miner kept up correspondence with several of her seven brothers, especially with Seth Miner, who moved west in search of work as a farm hand. Her brother Dan Miner stayed in the area, and she remained close with his family, including her nephew Chester and his wife Mabel Edith Irle Miner. Chester was involved in the Mahomet Baptist Church, and this collection touches on his interests. Chester's daughters, Irle and Mary, stayed in Dr. Miner's home in Champaign while attending school in Champaign.

In 1934, Dr. Miner, who had never married and did not wish to inconvenience her family in her old age, was committed to the state hospital in Kankakee, Illinois. She died there in October 1935, and her body was returned to Champaign County and interred in Mahomet, Illinois.

Scope and Content Note:

Materials in this collection range from 1859-1954, but the bulk of the records are from 1887-1934. The collection includes papers related to Ellen Miner and her close family members, including her brother Daniel Miner, her nephew Chester Miner, and her great-nieces Irle and Mary Miner who lived with her

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while attending school in Champaign. Chester's interests included the Mahomet Baptist Church. The collection also includes correspondence from Ellen's youngest brother Seth Miner, a farm hand living in the West.

The collection is primarily related to Dr. Miner's practice of gynecology and obstetrics in Champaign, Illinois beginning in 1896. It includes Dr. Miner's examination ledger and notes from patient consultations in 1907-1917; obstetric records of infants delivered from 1907-1921; notes from medical school on chemistry, pharmaceuticals, obstetrics, and Latin; correspondence with patients in reference to treatments; and other papers related to her practice. Dr. Miner treated irregular menstrual cycles, stomach complaints, pregnancy, post-pregnancy complications, uterine complications, and many other female ailments. Researchers can find information on gynecological practices from 1896 to the 1920s, women's medical history, local women's relationship with doctors and medicine, local history, and the Champaign medical community.

Arrangement:

The collection is arranged in 4 series: Biographical, Correspondence for Ellen Miner, Miner Family, and Oversized.

The Biographical Series contains information related to Dr. Miner's medical education, medical practice, and adult life. Materials are arranged by relevance and then chronologically.

The Correspondence for Ellen Miner series includes letters from her brothers and other assorted correspondence. Letters pertaining to medical services are filed with papers related to her medical practice. Materials are arranged alphabetically by sender and followed by a folder of "other" correspondents.

All resources related to other members of the Miner family are included in the Miner Family Series. Information about Ellen's and her siblings' educations, Daniel Miner, Chester Miner, Irle Miner, and Mary Miner are included in this series. These materials are organized chronologically.

The final series of Oversized Items includes Dr. Miner's Physical Geography Book from 1873, account books from her medical practice, and Mabel Edith Irle Miner's high school diploma, all organized chronologically.
